Looking Beyond 2018

In 2019 the American Indian Christian Mission will be celebrating 50 years of operation. We are inviting anyone who would like come to join us on our campus for a big celebration program on Saturday, July 13th 2019. Also in August of 2019 we would like to open our campus to High School students. They would stay in our dorms while they attended the High School in Show Low. This will allow our 8th grade students to have the option of staving with us rather than going back to the reservation. They may not want to go back to the reservation because of the problems they have to deal with such as bullying, alcoholism, and poor education systems. Also some do not have a good place to live (family issues, little food, crowded conditions, or other problems). In order to offer this to our students, we need additional Dorm Parents. We can not afford to hire them (at least not with our current income/donations) so we are asking for long term volunteers. We would provide room and board. Please let us know if you are interested or know someone who might be. In 2022 or 2023 we plan to offer High School classes on our campus. It will take many years to raise the funds needed to open a High School and get the needed accreditation, raise support to hire teachers and/or get volunteer teachers.

Reservation Outreach: Hayden Anderson

AICM's outreach efforts to reach White Mountain Apache Tribal members for Christ comes in various forms. Through AICM's bus ministry and camp programs many children have heard the gospel and several have accepted Jesus. I have been working mostly with adults on the Reservation, helping with both spiritual and physical needs. It has been a blessing to be part of the AICM team working on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation. I have been working in collaboration with an AICM volunteer, and the senior pastor of the White Mountain Apache Christian Church (WMACC). Thanks to our team effort, one of our projects has been very successful in spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ and developing friendship beyond expectations. Our team noticed that playing horseshoes is very popular on the reservation especially among middle and older age people. We set out to encourage, support, and show the love of Christ to this group of people. The team realized that there were many horseshoe pitchers' gathering places throughout the reservation. These places provide excellent locations for horseshoe pitching competitions, and they are places where people socialize and drink alcoholic beverages. Our team decided to select a horseshoe pit that had the worst reputation on the reservation, called the Wiener Roast Arena, to work with the people there. It became a place for good competition, where sober horseshoe pitchers' and spectators have fun and learn about Jesus. Many genuinely listen to the gospel being preached to them before the competition starts. To date, we have sponsored 36 horseshoe tournaments within three years (first year 8 tournaments, second 13, and third 15). The average participating pitchers per tournament are around 32 and we have had up to 42 pitchers. There are many prominent people and others living outside the boundary of the reservation that come over during these tournaments, including former Tribal Chairman, former Tribal Councilmen, current school board members, church pastors, traditional medicine men, Arizona State Horseshoe Champions, and so forth. A great number of community people know that AICM & WMACC sponsor these tournaments. There was a time when I was one of the guys drinking at the old Wiener Roast, and it has been my mission to make this a better place and to tell people how Christ changed my life. This project will set a standard of successful approaches for other projects to be welcomed onto the reservation..

I have to mention one other project that has great potential for helping Apaches, and that is the Canyon Day Community Center. It will be a location for community events and will provide vocational training & job placement (unemployment is a big problem on the Reservation.). We had hoped to get it started last year, but fundraising came short; however, we still hope to do this project once we get the funds.

We will continue with our efforts to bring a spark of togetherness, belonging, and seeing a brighter future for the reservation. Please keep me and those I work with in yours prayers as we continue to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ.
